

Rosebud Sheep Yield Large Crop of Wool; Ingomar Plant Busy

Forsyth, July 2.—(Special)—Sheep shearing on the Dowlin ranch was completed the first of the week, the total clip weighing 80,000 pounds. This was taken from 8,000 sheep, giving an average weight of 10 pounds of wool per head. The wool is being delivered to Forsyth for shipment.

Mr. Dowlin has begun crossing his sheep to the north side of the Yellowstone for summer range, the grass in that section being much better than it has been for a number of years, Mr. Dowlin says.

The shearing crew finished clipping 5,000 sheep on the Stellar ranch on the Little Porcupine, Friday, for James McGraw. Although the clip has not all been weighed it is expected to come to 45,000 pounds or about nine pounds per head. It will be brought to Forsyth this week and put in the Northern Pacific woolhouse for shipment.

A band of 2,700 yearling ewes from the Grimstad & Brown Sheep company of Ingomar averaged 11¾ pounds each, or 33,300 pounds, and 5,200 ewes from the same company averaged 10½ pounds each, or 54,600 pounds. Sixty thousand sheep have been sheared at Ingomar to date. The plant there is said to be the second largest in the United States.
