

Paul Nilson, Billings grade school student, was awarded first prize in the model glider flying contest sponsored by the Billings Lions club Sunday west of the senior high school. John Schutz, a high school student, entered a model which remained in flight 23½ seconds, which was longer than any other entry, but Nilson was permitted to choose his prize first.

Twelve models were entered in the contest, but several youths did not compete because they were unwilling to risk their models under cold, windy conditions. Other entrants, listed in order of length of time their models remained aloft, were:

Rockwood Brown and Tom Heald (joint ownership of one machine), Frank Adams, Richard Porter, William MacDonald, Jack Riedesel, Kenneth Sauvageau, Harry Straw and Teddy Zysewski. Gloria Knudsen, only girl entered, also was awarded a prize.

Some models were launched by towline, others by rubber catapult and some were hand launched. Donald Sump, chairman of the Lions committee in charge of the contest, said all times were "terrible" because of the wind.

The next contest sponsored by the Lions will be April 27, open to any rubber-propelled plane. Fuselage models will compete for prizes May 8, Sump announced.
