I JOHN BROWN 1

John Brown, the immigrant ancestor, according to one of his deeds on record at Cambridge, was born in Scotland. Many soldiers taken prisoner by Cromwell were sent to New England and placed with the settlers for stated periods, and most of the Scots appearing in Massachusetts Bay about 1650-60 came in this way. John Brown was born in 1631. He settled in Marlborough, Massachusetts, about 1662, having lived previously at Cambridge. In 1678, after King Philip's war, he sold his farm at Marlborough to Thomas Rice and probably then removed to Falmouth (now Portland), Maine. He removed from Falmouth to Watertown. His will, in which he is designated as "late of Falmouth", mentions his wife, sons John, Thomas, Daniel and Joseph, daughter Deborah Meacham, sons-in-law John Gustin, John Adams, Thomas Darley (or Darby) and John Hartshorn. He married, 24 April 1655, Esther Makepeace, daughter of Thomas Makepeace of Boston.

II JOSEPH BROWN 3

(John)

Joseph Brown, son of John Brown was born on December 1, 1677 in, Marlborough, Middlesex, Massachusetts. He was a cordwainer by trade. He probably settled in Watertown Farms, now Weston, Massachusetts as he sold to Benjamin Garfield seventy-two acres of land in Weston, April 20, 1700, about the time he removed to Lexington. He and his wife were admitted to the Lexington church, May 1713 and of this church he was afterward deacon until he died. He was constable in 1700 and town clerk of Watertown in 1708. His mother conveyed to him a house and six acres of land in Watertown, 16 March 1698/99, bounded northeast and west by land of John Barnard, south by the highway. He bought seventy-two acres of land in Watertown, 4 January 1708/09, of John Mixer and wife Abigail with house, bounded by lands of Daniel Harrington, Thomas Woolson, Samuel Whitney and John Warren. He bought and sold other parcels of land in Watertown. He married in Watertown, 15 November 1699, Ruhamah Wellington, daughter of Benjamin and Elizabeth (Sweetman) Wellington⁴. He died 11 January 1766 aged about eighty-six, according to the record, and his widow died 1 July 1772, aged ninety two.

Benjamin Brown was chosen deacon 14 October 1768 and was a member of the Committee of Correspondence, justice of the peace, representative to the General Court and on 10 December 1787, was chosen delegate to the State Convention to ratify the Constitution of the United States. At a town meeting held 4 April 1791, he was elected on a committee to present a memorial to Congress, asking them to erect a monument over the remains of the persons who were slain at Lexington on the 19th of April 1775. He was also in office as a selectman, assessor, and town treasurer, and served in the militia during the Revolutionary period.

James Brown, son of Joseph Brown, was born in Lexington and baptized there July 1713; died there 13 June 1768. He was a selectman 1756, was chosen deacon 1756, and filled the office until his death. He married 21 January 1734/35, Jane Bowman, daughter of Nathaniel and Anne (Barnard) Bowman⁷. Jane died 8 May 1762 and he married (second), 18 May 1762, Elizabeth Smith, widow of Hezekiah Smith.

Francis Brown and his wife were admitted to the church 24 November 1765. He was one of Capt. Parker's company on the morning of 19 April 1775. When the enemy were returning from Concord, they were met again by Capt. Parker's company in Lincoln, where Francis Brown received a very severe wound. IV. REV. JOSEPH BROWN 8910

(James, Joseph, John)

Rev. Joseph Brown, son of James and Jane (Bowman) Brown, was born in Lexington, Massachusetts, 14 April 1741, and was graduated at Harvard College in 1763. He was a class mate in college with Josiah Quiney, Josh Upham, Samson Salter Blowers, Timothy Pickering and Caleb Gannett. He received his Masters degree at Harvard in 1766. He married 7 May 1765, Sarah Smith, daughter of Hezekiah and Elizabeth (Billings) Smith. He was admitted tofull communion in the church 6 May 1764 and dismissed to the church at Winchindon, Massachusetts where he was ordained and installed as minister in April 1766 succeeding the Rev. Daniel Stimson. He was a preacher of ability and for thirty years was the beloved and honored pastor of this church. But when age began to creep up on him a faction arose in the church against him, resulting finally in his dismissal, 3 September 1799 by an ecclesiastical council which exonerated him from any real blame.



During Mr. Brown's pastorate a new meeting house, was built, dedicated 1 January 1793. Mr. Brown preached a memorial sermon in 1799 on the occasion of Washington's death. It was printed and some copies have been preserved, while the original manuscript is in the possession of his descendants. He removed to Windsor county, Vermont, about 1800, and supplied the pulpit at Springfield, and also at Guilford. He died in 1810 at the home of his son-in-law in Windsor, Vermont.

One of the most controversial events in the two hundred year history of the town of Winchendon was the dismissal in 1799 of Rev. Joseph Brown, after thirty years of service. The causes of the disatisfaction of the people with him are mostly obscured, but are said to

have been mainly those "such as grow out of a hasty temper and imprudent speech." The whole community was divided into two hostile sections. The majority of the church sympathized with it's minister while the majority of the town opposed him. Traditional gossip of old times gives a more romantic version of the story. It appears that "a prominent actor in the scenes" had at one time been courting a daughter of the minister, "but finding one possessed of greater charms, in the person of a daughter of a leading member of the parish" the young man deserted the minister's daughter for the other woman. According to tradition, "this was the egg, which in after years was hatched, and became the source of alienation, finally involving the whole town in a violent quarrel." Whatever the cause, the controversy went forward and soon made its way into the official records of the town. When Rev. Brown was dismissed, it is said he took with him all the records of the church. All efforts to induce him to surrender these documents were never successful, the history of the church from its foundation in 1762 to 1799 is almost a blank."

V. AMOS SMITH BROWN

(Joseph, James, Joseph, John)

Amos Smith Brown was born July 1782 in Winchendon, Worcestor Co., Massachusetts. He was the son of Rev. Joseph Brown and Sarah (Smith) Brown. In "The Official History of Guilford, Vermont," it refers to a potash and pearlash works built on land of Joseph Bullock about 1780, which was sold several times until 1803 when Amos Brown bought it. That same year he mortgaged it to John Richardson, who obtained possession of the property by foreclosure. January 18, 1804 he married Elizabeth Bullock daughter of William Bullock and Miriam (Whitney) Bullock. Ten children were born to Amos and Elizabeth. The family resided in Essex, Chittendon County, Vermont from 1812, and possibly earlier, until at least April of 1832. It appears they moved to New York some time between that date and 1835, because early in the fall of that year a party of about 25 persons, all from Monroe Co., New York started out for the purpose of making a settlement on property that Rev. Jonathan N. Hinckley and Barnard M. Howard had purchased and erected the walls of a log cabin, when they had visited the region now known as Breedsville, Van Buren County, Michigan. They journeyed via the Erie Canal to Buffalo, then by Lake Erie to Detroit. In the latter city they bought an ox-team and wagon. On their wagon they loaded their household goods and the small children, and then with the major portion of their number on foot, set out via the Territorial road for Paw Paw. It occupied two days to cut out roads and make their way from the settlement to the cabin waiting for them on the banks of the outlet. Here all arrived safely, October 1, 1835, and here began the first settlement of any importance in the northern half of Van Buren County.

This party of emigrants included Amos Smith Brown, his wife, Elizabeth and five of their children; Sarah S., Amos S. Jr., Wells G., Minerva, and Jesse R. Harriette M. the youngest child had died before they left Essex and Edwin, Louisa, Luman and Amasa Merriman, who was a practicing physician in Sheldon, remained in Vermont. Luman, at a later period followed the family to Michigan, entered the army, was wounded at the battle of Pittsburgh Landing, and died from its effects. The unfinished cabin was soon made in a hospitable condition. The next house was for the Brown family, which was followed by another. These three houses sheltered the colonists during the first winter. For the next few years more emigrants arrived and more houses erected. In 1838 the first tannery was constructed and the first school house was built. For several years the early residents procured their mail at Paw Paw. Upon the establishment of the Breedsville office, Amos Brown became the first postmaster, and Jesse R. Brown carried the first mail between Breedsville and Paw Paw. The assessment-roll for the year 1839 for the townships of South Haven shows Amos owned 160 acres of land and the aggregate of his real and personal estate was \$765. Elizabeth died 15 August 1839 and Amos remarried Hannah Barber 24 March 1842. He and the three younger boys, Amos, Jr., Wells G., and Jesse R., continued the working of the family farm until his death, 31 September 1843, at which time the boys formed a copartnership.





Amos Smith Brown, Jr. was a representative from Van Buren county, Michigan in 1867. He settled in Michigan in 1835 at the present village of Breedsville. Van Buren county, occupies the farm which was his 1st Michigan home. Commencing life with little but industry and superior financial ability, he accumulated a large property, being alike successful in farming lumbering and milling. He aided liberally in all public improvements, and never forgot the needy. He was for 25 years supervisor of the town of Columbia. In politics a Republican.

VI. AMASA MERRIMAN BROWN 21

(Amos, Joseph, James, Joseph, John)

Amasa Merriman Brown was born 22 June 1812 in Stanestad County, Quebec, Canada. He was the fourth child of Amos Smith Brown and Elizabeth (Bullock) Brown. He got his early education in the log schoolhouse in Essex and went on to graduate from Dartmouth College of Medicine in 1839. In 1840 he settled in Sheldon, Franklin County to practice as a physician and surgeon and on the 21st of November 1841, married Abby Keith, the daughter of Oliver Allen Keith and Martha (Brooks) Keith. Amasa Brown was one of three doctors in Franklin county to examine troops for the Civil War and also one of the original incorparators of the St. Albans Hospital. He was elected Town Clerk in





1849, and acted in the position for forty consecutive years. He represented Sheldon in the General Assembly

in 1854 and again in 1855. At various times he served as Selectman and Lister. He also practiced medicine in Sheldon for forty years; in later years with his son Edwin Merriman Brown until his death 5 June 1885.

Amasa Merriman and Abby had five children; Sarah Elizabeth, Oliver Keith, Martha Caroline, Edwin Merriman, and Alfred Keith. Abby²² wrote in a her many journals over the years of the busy life she and Amasa Merriman led. He was away a great deal of the time caring for his patients in Sheldon and in the surrounding communities, no matter what the weather or time of day or night. Abby was at home taking care of the children and household chores and social obligations. It was a busy time.

Edwin Merriman Brown, son of Amasa and Abby (Keith) Brown was born in Sheldon December 5, 1855. He attended the Sheldon schools, then graduated from Burr and Burton Seminary of Manchester, Vermont in 1875. He graduated from the University of Vermont Medical College in 1879. For two years he practiced medicine in East Berkshire. He came to Sheldon in 1881 where he continued in medicine the rest of his life. On October 6, 1881 Dr. E.M. Brown married Fannie Comings of East Berkshire. In 1885 he succeeded his father as Town Clerk of Sheldon and acted in that capacity fifty-two years, and as a doctor



for the same length of time. Other activities which were a big part of Dr. Brown's daily life were; Superintendent of School, Library Trustee, Health Officer and in 1890 he represented Sheldon in the General Assembly. In the General Assembly he served on the Education and Insane Committee. In 1894 he was chosen Senator from Franklin County and acted as chairman of the Committee on Claims. He was a member of the committee on State's Prison and the joint committee on public health. He was chosen as a delegate to the National Republican Convention in 1900. He served a second time as Senator in 1902. He was a member of the County, State and National Medical Associations, a member of the U.S. Pension Examiner's Board for Franklin County, a Director of the St. Albans Hospital and a member of the Consulting Staff. He acted as a Director of the Enosburg Falls Savings Bank and Trust Company. Dr. Brown didn't have time to be an active farmer but he owned two farms in Sheldon. One might say that the Brown family has made medical services a tradition; his father, Dr. Amasa Merriman Brown, two sons-in-law, three grandsons, and a nephew, Dr. Amasa Merriman Brown, were doctors. Two granddaughters were nurses. Dr. Edwin Merriman Brown died in 1935. Fanny (Comings) Brown died in 1941.

VII. ALFRED KEITH BROWN 27 28

(Amasa, Amos, Joseph, James, Joseph, John)

Alfred Keith Brown was born 14 May 1858 in Sheldon, Vermont, the son of Amasa Merriman Brown and Abigail Keith. He married Ellen Julia Smith 20 November 1882 in East Berkshire, Franklin Co, Vermont. She was born 11 July 1858, the daughter of Joseph Perkins and Ellen M. (Austin) Smith. Alfred was educated in the common schools, and at the famous Burr & Burton Seminary at Manchester, Vt., graduating from there in 1876. He then entered Dartmouth College, but was compelled by sickness to leave at the



end of his first year. After that he spent a year in Wisconsin, but in 1880 entered

the Law Department of the University of Michigan, and remained there one year. He then returned to Vermont and his native town, and began a course of law study with Counselor Charles P. Hogan, and was admitted to practice at the September term in 1882. In the fall of the same year he was chosen Assistant Secretary of the Senate, and reelected in 1884. In January, 1883, he commenced practice at Richford, in partnership with Colonel E. H. Powell. In 1888 he was elected state's attorney, and re-elected in the fall of 1890.

Alfred Keith and Ellen (Smith) Brown lived in Richford, Vermont in a large corner house by the bridge on Main Street on the left side of the street by the Commings furniture mill. This is evidently where their children were born. This house is still standing (1976). It was sold after he died 21 November 1896. Ellen moved up on the hill to a duplex near the Episcopal Church. They lived on the 2nd floor. After the children were grown Ellen moved to the house diagonally across the street and two houses down from the I.B. Hawley house on South Main. Ellen (or Nellie, as she was called) was the librarian in Richford for many years and worked hard to give her four sons college educations--two lawyers, a successful businessman, and a doctor. She died in Richford February 18, 1949. They are buried in the Hillside Cemetery in Richford.²⁹



ROCKWOOD SMITH BROWN³¹

(Alfred, Amasa, Amos, Joseph, James, Joseph, John)

Rockwood Smith Brown was born February 12, 1887 in Richford, Franklin County, Vermont, the son of Alfred Keith Brown and Ellen (Nellie) Julia (Smith) Brown. He was married 8 October 1913 in Richford, Vermont to Elizabeth C. Hawley, daughter of Israel Bulkley and Ruby (Corliss) Hawley . His father was a lawyer who practiced in Richford and Rockwood grew up wanting to follow in his footsteps. Rockwood had four brothers: Amasa Merriman, Donald Rugg, Robert Keith, and a younger brother, Alfred Keith who died in infancy. He was born in a large corner house on Main Street near the bridge and Commings furniture mill. The house was sold after Alfred Keith Brown's death in 1896 and was still standing in 1976. His mother, Ellen (Smith) Brown moved up on the hill to a duplex near the Episcopal

Church at Town House Hill and Church Streets. They lived on the 2nd floor. After her children were grown, Ellen moved to South Main Street in a house diagonally across and 2 houses down from the I.B. Hawley house where she died in 1949.

Rockwood lived with Samuel B. Green and Caroline (Hoar) Green when he was a student at the University of Vermont in Burlington. He graduated from the University of Michigan Law School in 1911. After graduation, Rockwood and his college friend O. K. Grimstad were planning to go to Seattle to open a law office but their money ran out when they reached Montana. They considered opening an office in Roundup first, but then decided they liked Billings better. Mr. Langworthy, President of the Montana National Bank loaned them \$200 to open an office on the top floor of the Acme Building. Rockwood returned to Richford to marry Elizabeth Hawley in October 1913. After a fire in the Acme Building caused the loss of many law books and papers, Rockwood and his partner, known as "Grim", moved to the Montana Electric building where their offices remained for many years. Eventually they moved to the Montana National Bank Building and after OK Grimstad's death the offices were enlarged and other lawyers were taken into the firm. Wyo Ben Products was started in 1931 after Rockwood succeeded Western Clay Products Co. It was incorporated on 30 October 1963. His eldest son, Keith Brown was elected as President, R. E. Dansby, Jr. as Vice President, and Rockwood Brown, Rockwood's youngest son, as Secretary. (Note: See "Wyo-Ben and its History of Creation" by Neal Hawley Brown").



Rockwood died March 5 1956 while on an extended vacation in Fort Meyers, Florida. The members of the Yellowstone County Bar Association adopted a special resolution in his memory and reviewed his life as follows: "He was a man of high intelligence. He had a keen analytical mind and was a skilled attorney and counselor. He excelled in corporation and business law, but was skillful in all branches of the law. He was a devoted husband and father. He had a genial, friendly and likeable personality. He had a host of friends and was well liked by all his associates and enjoyed the respect and friendship of judges and of fellow attorneys. His abilities will be greatly missed by his clients and associates and his many friends will miss his serene and happy companionship, Therefore, be it resolved that this bar association extend to his wife and children our heartfelt sympathy and that in

testimony of our respect and regard for him may a copy of this resolution be spread upon the minutes of this association, the minutes of the 13th Judicial District of the State of Montana and be given to his family."



He was also an officer of Inland Supply Co and Concrete Productas Co. Inc. He holds the position of Senior Vice President – Legal of Wyo-Ben, Inc. (1995).

Wyo-Ben and Its History of Creation as I Saw It.33

Back in the days when my father, Rockwood Brown, Sr., was traveling down to Greybull, Wyoming to see clients, he would look at the scenery now and then to keep fromgoing to sleep at the wheel. Though the area is rather sparse in vegetation it doeshave a rather beautiful feature that most city people don't recognize and that is the geological uplift structure of the land.



Well one day these events did occur and when he was looking out into the landscape of uplifted geological structure he noticed a light colored material laying upon a rather dark rock layer, so he found a side trail off the highway and proceeded to investigate this phenomena. As he got closer to the uplifted structure he noticed that many of these formations were side by side at an uplifted angle of about 45 degrees facing in an easterly direction and that the light colored material looked rather pure in nature with a granular

texture. He got out of his car and picked up a sample of this material then returned to the highway and proceeded on his way to see his client.

When he got back to Billings he packaged up the samples he had acquired and sent them off to the Bureau of Mines in Butte, Montana. He shortly got a return answer to his query about the samples. They informed him that they were a rather pure form of a clay called bentonite which is a swelling clay, meaning it swells up when exposed to water. These particular samples would absorb about seven times their own volumn of water which relates to a very pure form of this type of clay. In the past these clays were used for lining irrigation ditches or for the use of drilling mud as a bit lubricant when drilling oil wells.

My father had a very good friend on the Montana Water Board named George Sahenin and when he contacted him, George said they could use a product like this to line the Montana State irrigation ditches which were in very bad repair---and when could he start receiving this material. Dad was rather taken back at the time for he did not realize that he had hit upon a very good thing.

At the time my brother, Keith, had returned from WW2 and had started up a concrete block plant in Billings and was very busy with it, but Dad was rather insistent that Keith try to get down to Wyoming as soon as possible to find a way to bring some of this bentonite to a railroad siding or a place it could be trucked up to the Montana Water Board for use by the State of Montana. Keith reluctantly found the time and followed up on Dad's request a short time later and the Water Boad received their bentonite. As it worked out, the mining of the bentonite required further expansion so the first step was to claim as much of this product as could be claimed, to protect his interest. But he could only claim so much land in his own name so he asked all of the members of the family to use their names on the claims so more land could be claimed and they would also be future partners in the corporation as it progressed. He named the company Wyo-Ben Products, derived from Wyoming bentonite as the name implies.

He then proceeded to find further uses for this product and the methods of refining it for that particular use. The concrete block business got to be very competitive and he proceeded to put his efforts into the making of his new company, Wyo-Ben Products, Inc. It was incorporated, 30 October 1963 wirh authorized capital stock of 5000 shares of common stock. Keith Brown, President, R. E. Dansby, Jr., Vice President, and Rockwood Brown (2), Secretary.



This required him to design and build a larger plant in Greybull, Wyoming, near the claims of bentonite. Keith venjoyed this very much. He was an engineer at heart anyway. You see, when he got out of high school in the "30s he liked to design all kinds of things. He especially liked cars and modernistic streamlining, etc. He liked to draw and many of his ideas were before his time. Basically he wanted to be an engineer but being the oldest son in those days and wanting to go to college, it was usually recognized that he follow in

his father's footsteps. Therefore he went to the University of Vermont to study law but upon graduation opted not to

take the Montana State Bar examination to become a lawyer. Then WW2 came and went. After WW2, I spent 12 years in Providence, Rhode Island and had no direct contact with Wyo-Ben during that time although Keith had asked if I could come to Montana to help him with it but I was following an endeavor in the television industry which was just beginning to form and Dorothy did not wish to leave her mother and father in Rhode Island. After her mother passed away we moved to Billings but by that time Wyo-Ben was up and running. I started field work doing claim post survey,

During the time Dad had the ranch at Custer he ran a lot of sheep and grazed them in Ingomar as well as sheared them for wool there. He was in partnership with Sonny Mogelson and some other person I believe, part of that time. While he had the sheep he was going through a very expensive learning curve with the sheep herders. Since he supplied them with all their food and supplies he apparently gave some of them the authority to buy their own goods in the store while he was not present. I remember one herder that bought a years supply of caviar and other expensive canned



goods. When Dad got the bill he was very angry and you can be sure, got rid of the sheep herder immediatley. While running the ranches I recall similar circumstances with the share croppers he placed there. At the time he would purchase all their machinery, but they would not take care of it. It cost him a bundle! He later required the farmer to purchase his own tools.

The Forsyth ranch was a straight farming arrangement and the share-cropper farmer ran some cattle also. It was on the Forsyth ranch that Dad tried to incorporate some wild turkeys which he had shipped up from Texas, but after about 3 years there was only one male left—the cyotes got the rest. I remember that after WW2 started he brought the old 1928 Packard down there and jacked up the rear end and used it to pump water out of the slue. To my knowledge it is still there. I sure would like to find it for restoration.

Glen Ferguson farmed the ranch. His wife's name was Tear and they had a son named Gene. She was very obese and had a wonderful personality and was the greatest cook you could imagine. During harvest time I still remember having boiled pigs feet that I have not been able to duplicate in all these years. I spent at least one summer there working at the Forsyth ranch and I remember one time I had gone fishing in the river and caught a large channel catfish. As you know, they have to be skinned before you cook them, so I nailed the head to a board and proceeded to skin it with a very large butcher knife. As I was starting to do the job, Tear called me to lunch so I suspended the skinning job and before leaving the nailed fish on the board at my feet, I threw the butcher knife at the board. Unfortunately my right foot was on the board holding the fish and I had not moved it before throwing the knife. The knife went through my shoe right next tomny big toe. I reached down and pulled the knife out and then started to bleed like a stuck pig. Must have hit an artery. I hollared to Tear and she came out real excited. I knew about pressure points so applied pressure to my right foot and slowed the bleeding but she went ballistic and called Mom and Dad in Billings and told them they would take me to the Forsyth Hospital and they could meet us there. After it was over I had to return to Billings and that was the end of my summer at the ranch.

Dad started the Gas Co-op and the office was in the front portion of his own law office in the top floor of the First National Bank Bldg. When it finally petered out after the war there were several of the old stations left, so Austin Darkenwald was hired to manage them as cut rate gas stations. I did part time duty on two of them—one in Glendive and the other in Livingston. They were finally sold to the Little Chief Corporation, who eventually sold the properties to the large chains.

There were two El-Campos—one on the east side of town across the street from the front entrance to the Fair Grounds. I used to park cars west of there during fair time. The other one was on the Laurel road just after you passed through the underpass west of Montana Avenue and was called West El-Campo Motel. Louis Day and family worked as caretakers there and also lived in a house in back of the motel. We used to sell fireworks there on Fourth of July just before we went up to our cabins for the summer at 4K Dude Ranch.

As I remember, Dad joined forces with a fellow named Jud Frerry, a private owner and banker from Cut Bank. They used to go into the area of Winnet near Brush Creek to do a lot of wildcat drilling. They threw a lot of money in the holes but never came up with more than an odor of oil. I know because I went on the last one and after they had drilled for a couple of weeks, all they got was—you could smell it, you could taste it, but you could not see it. It had been there at one time but had passed through the zone.

Dad was the First President of the Hilands Golf and County Club. He helped start the Billings Mustang Basebasll Club and they built the first ball park on the grounds west of the East El-Campo Motel. He had a 50/50 interest in KBMY Radio station and a 50/50 interest in Roscoe Steel. His interests were far reaching and diversified and for the most part he was successful in most everything he ventured to do.











Custer Ranch

A long time ago you asked me for a history of the Custer Ranch. I dug up an old abstract of title on the ranch properties, which contains condensed copies of all of the documents of record for the property in the Yellowstone Clerk and Recoders office, dating back to the first insurance of land title by the U.S. Patents. I learned that on March 24 1917, Billings Realty and Development Co. conveyed by Warranty deed to C. O. Grimstad, an unmarried man, all of the farm excepting the easterly portion which was then owned by A.M. Cooley and Margaret Cooley. I've never heard of C.O. Grimstad, but guess he was a brother of Dad's partner, O. K. Gramstad. On May 15 1922, C.O. Grimstad deeded the land to Grimrock Co. Inc. (whose name was subsequently changed to Grimrock Ranch Co. Inc.). Grimrock Ranch was, I believe, owned 50/50 by Dad and O.K. Gramstad. O. K. Grimstad died about 1928 or so. In an apparent settlement with the Grimstad estate, Grimrock Ranch conveyed the farm (not including the Cooley farm) to Rockwood Brown on January 2 1931, Separately, Dad purchased the Cooley farm, lying adjacent to the East of the Grimrock Ranch farm, in August of 1929.

Dad picked up a lot of the grazing land across the river in the 1930s as it came up for sale by mortgage companies after they had acquired title by mortgage foreclosure. Those must have been tough times for farmers/ranchers. I note in the abstract Dad couldn't pay the taxes on the farm and let it be sold to the County. He redeemed the Tax Sale Certificates in 1934 by payment of \$380.67. It looks like Dad lived on the financial edge in those days and he was often broke and then when he recovered, he plunged again.



NOTES FROM TRIP TO NEW ENGLAND, CANADA, NOVA SCOTIA AND NEW BRUNSWICK

By Alfred Keith Brown

Wednesday, September 28, 1977

Visited Grace Episcopal Church at Sheldon, Vermont. Retired minister, Vernon A. Weaver greeted us in his yard across the street and directed us to the cemetery behind the church. Did not get in [to the church] as it was locked and the key held by Rev. Benjamin Chase at Swanton, Vt.. Head stones as follows were found:

Oliver A. Keith, Esq., Feb. 22, 1841, Age 55

A stone with top half gone--no markings. Found between Oliver and Abigail Keith.

Abigail Keith, June 30, 1828, Age 62, 1 Month and 21 days.

Ruel, son of Cyrus and Mary Keith, July 8, 1831.

Cyrus Keith, March 1844, Age 49.

Reuel Keith D.D., Sept 2, 1842, Age

Martha E. Keith, Daughter of Oliver A and Martha Keith, 9-1-1844, Age 16 yrs, 6 months.

Sally, wife of Unite Keith, June 12, 1851.

Sophia Poric (?) Sheldon, May 1833, 26 yrs old.

Rev. Weaver's wife came out and talked to us--sparkling elderly lady, pint size--and their niece, a Mrs. Armstrong drove up. Seems Mrs. Armstrong took nurses training with Nedra.[Brown]

In the discussion it seemed we may be remotely related through a Bruce Corliss of Sheldon. I don't recall how but Mrs. Weaver seemed to know there was a connection. Bruce Corliss died a week ago at 91. [October, 1977]

Mrs. Armstrong said we should contact Dr. Swizler's wife in St. Albans. She is Elizabeth (Fletcher) Brown, daughter of Dr. Edwin Merriman Brown of Sheldon. I can't figure the relationship to our Dr. Merriman, as he had to be a generation ahead of our uncle since Mrs. Swizler is 79 (?)--per Mrs. Armstrong. Could be he was Uncle Merriman and Dad's uncle. [Yes]

The Hawleys are supposed to be in the Underhill area according to Mrs. Weaver--will check this if possible.

We asked the Rev. Weaver who we could contact about restoring the cemetery and decided that Bishop Kerr at Burlington would be the best--will try to get more on this.

Last item--the house next to the church was said to be the Keith house by Rev. Weaver--Quote, "We always felt the house should have been given to the church but they, (the Keiths) didn't.".

From Sheldon we drove to Richford where it was raining, as it has been every day for weeks. I got pictures of Grandma Brown and Grandma and Grandpa Hawley's house. Went to the town clerks office (Town Clerk's name Wendal Fortie) and checked on the cemetery where Grandpa and Grandma Hawley were buried. It was Hillside Cemetery off the road to the golf course east of town. Also checked on Grandma Brown. They did not have a burial record for her. Showed where she had been taken to the vault. She died Feb. 18, 1949.

Went to the cemetery and located the stone for Grandpa Alfred Keith Brown and Grandma Nellie Julia. Next to these graves were Uncle Donald and Aunt Helen and son Merriman, who died in 1943. Took photo record.

We covered the cemetery mostly in a drizzling rain, looking for Grandpa and Grandma Hawley's graves but couldn't find them, although the clerk records say that was where they were buried.

The Clerk--Mr. Fortie--said that a Reginald Rowley has the records of the cemetery. He apparently is the caretaker and is known locally as "Dig". Will contact him if Mary Ruby can't throw light on the question. Will see her tomorrow night in Wells River.

Miscellaneous information: Uncle Donald was the informant for the records on Grandma Brown, which show the following: Born Berkshire, Vt. 1859, Father Joseph Smith,--born Montgomery. Mother, Ellen Austin--born in Vermont.--no other information.

An Ernest Shattuck died at 84 in August, 1949--buried Hillside Cemetery. Aunt Helen's name was Shattuck.

Israel Buckley Hawley died Oct. 4, 1941.

We saw a plot of Corliss and Goff, two other Hawley family stones.

An old and large Brown stone with 2 names inscribed. Believe this dated very early 1800.

Got dark and raining--left for campsite north of Burlington.

IV. Henry Adams^{39 40}

Henry Adams the emigrant ancestor of a numerous and distinguished American family was born 21 January 1593 in the Parish of Barton St. David, Somersetshire, England. The son of John and Agnes (Stone) Adams, grandson of Henry Adams and great grandson of John Adams, all of the same Barton St. David.

Not much is known of the life in England prior to the removal to America in 1638 with wife and children, but before 1622 he had removed to the neighboring Parish of Kingweston where the baptisms of his seventh and ninth children were recorded, as now preserved in the Bishop of Wells transcripts of Parish register.

He married at Charlton-Wachrell, Co, Somerset, 19 October 1609, Edith Squire, baptized there 29 May 1609, daughter of Henry Squire. In 1638, Henry Adams and all his family, except his son Jonathan who remained in England 12 years longer, emigrated to New England. The exact date of their arrival is not known and the earliest record of him is 24 February 1639./40 when he obtained a grant of land from the town of Boston to forty acres at Mt. Wollaston for ten heads, which became his homestead and remained partially in the male line of descendants until about 1845 when the last occupant had removed to Bridgewater.

Henry Adams was one of the first settlers in that part of the Massachusetts Bay designated "Mr. Wollaston," which was incorporated in 1640 as the town of Braintree. It included what is now Quincy, Braintree and Randolph, Mass 1633. Henry Adams did not live long in New England, as he was buried at Braintree (now Quincy) 8 October 1646, age about 63 years. His will dated 1646 mentions his wife and children who are to share his property, but omits the three eldest sons who evidently had previously received something from him.

His will was proved June 8, 1647, and is as follows:

"First, my will is that my sonne Peter and John, and my daughter Ursula, shall have the grounde in the neck, both upland and meadow during the term I was to enjoy it, until it reurrne into the towne's hands againe, from whom I had it; also the aker in the mill fields: my will is that my bookes shall be divided amongst all my children, that my wife shall have and enjoy all my other goods so long as shee live unmarried, and if shee marry, then my will is y't Joseph, Edward and my daughter Usula should enjoy all my ground in the fielde y't lieth on the way to Weymouth Ferry, and my house lott, with all the houses and fruit trees and all my moveables at the death or marriage of my wife, provided they and their mother shall pay to my sonne Samuel that which is due to him for the ground I bought of him, to be paid in convenient tyme; but in case God soe deal with my wife that she bee constrained to make use of something by way of sale, shee may:---finally, for movables, my will is that my sonne Peter and John shall have an equal share with my sonne Joseph and Edward, and my daughter Ursula"

It is a matter of regret that so little has been preserved, and is positively known of the ancestry, life and character of the noted progenitor of the Adams family of Quincy. It is known that he was a malster as well as yeoman, or farmer, and a plain, unassuming man of tact and ability, who came to America for a better opportunity for his large family. There is nothing to show that he bore any titles, or assumed any rank among nobility.

1. Lieutenant Henry Adams

Lieut. Henry Adams was the first Town Clerk of Braintree, also of Medfield, and was the Representative of the town in the General Court for the years 1659, 65, 74, and 75. He was Lieutenant of the Medfield military company, which fought against the Indians in 1675-76. He was killed by the Indians while standing in his doorway, 21 February 1676, the second year of the war. His wife was accidentally shot the same day, at Rev. Mr. Wilson's house, and died 29th of February. She was confined to the house by sickness, and was in a bed in the chamber, when the gun in the hands of Capt. John Jacob of Hingham, who had charge of a company of about 80 men stationed at Medfield, was accidentally discharged in the room below her, the ball passing through her bed.

2. Lieutenant Thomas Adams

Lieut. Thomas removed to Concord, Mass. in 1646, settling in the west part of the town of Chelmsford in 1650-4. He was chosen chief Sergeant of the military company in 1659, but the County Court refused to confirm him on account of his religious views. BIXBY ANCESTRY

Bixby Origins⁵⁹

The word "Bix" is of Danish orgin. The root "Bix" in its ancient sense meant a small store and "by" means a village. One can deduce that "Bixby" signifies a village with a small store. In modern usage "Bix" can mean "junk". Perhaps in the same sense that inexpensive jewelry from variety stores has been known in America as "junk jewelry".⁶⁰

The names of towns and villages in the vicinity of England occupied by the Danelaw end with the syllable "by" or "thorpe", either of which means a village or town. The Danes invaded England in the 8th Century and had become well established in-land from the eastern coast of England by the 9th Century. The area under control of the Danes was known as the "Danelaw". Modern Suffolk County, England is well within the medieval Danelaw. However, through the centuries, there was probably an ethnic merging of the Danish and Anglo-Saxon blood. It is possible that the name Bixby is even more ancient than the Danelaw. About 1500 Bekesby appears to have been used interchangeably with Bixby. The earliest form of the name so far discovered is Bekesby. It was so spelled in 1427, and probably pronounced much as pronounced today. This study, however, while showing quite clearly the derivation of the similar names Bigsby, Bixley, and Bixton, has not revealed how and why the name was assumed by Walter Bekesby, the first man to bear the name so far as known.

I. Walter Byxby

Walter Bekesby or Byxby, was born probably about 1390, and died at Thorp Morieux, co. Suffolk, England in 1459. He was probably the son of **John Bekesby** who was named on a list of tenants of the manor of Falsham dated 9 October 1404. He married **Margery** -------, who was living in June 1459 when he made his will.⁶⁴

"Thorpe Morieux was a small parish and township in western Suffolk where in 1427 Walter was purchasing land. In 1459 his will mentioned two sons, Robert and Nicholas, names perpetuated in later generations of Bixbys. Although it cannot be proved that all persons bearing the Bixby name are descendants of Walter Bekesby, or possibly his father, who yet remains undiscovered, the increase of the number of Bixbys in the Suffolk, England area after 1427 is such as would apparently have been the case, and it is not doubted that all persons bearing the name are descended from one man living in 1427. The Bixbys in Thorpe Morieux were evidently among the more important residents and were well-to-do yeomen farmers, owning land as freehold as well as copyhold estate. There is no question that the parents and grandparents of Joseph Bisby, the first Bixby emigrant to the United States froin whom we have descended were landowners and persons of worth in their English village communities." 65 66

BIXBY ANCESTRY IN AMERICA68

I. Joseph Bixby

"Joseph is called by some the Father of the American Bixby's. This does not mean that there were not immigranats of other Bixby families who came to America. Joseph Bixby migrated from Boxford, Suffolk County to Ipswich, England along with numerous other migrants, which probably accounts for the name of their new town in America.

The Massachusetts Bay Colony was founded in 1629 and it has been estimated that there were 20,000 Englishmen oi the Atlantic Coast by 1640. Most of these were in New England. If one were to take a simple assumption that the average family of immigrants was five persons, including children and servants, it indicates that only some 4,000 families existed on the Atlantic Coast in 1640."

"The compendium of American Geneology—First Families of America", lists Joseph Bicby as having been baptized in 1621 at Little Waldingfield, Suffolk County, England, the son of George Bixby and his wife Ann Cole Bixby, or as the name appears in the parish register, Bixbee. One could surmise then that Joseph was a youth of 15 or 16 years of age when he came to America as a bound servant or as is sometimes called, an indentured servant. Numerous people migrated to America as bound servants because they lacked the funds to pay for ship's passage. The reasons for Joseph becoming indentured are probably lost to history. The old rule of primo-geniture, which grants to the oldest son the right to inherit the entire estate of his father, probably influenced many younger sons to seek their fortunes in the New World.

Joseph Bixby married the widow of Luke Heard at Ipswich, Massachusetts, in 1647. Her maiden name was Sarah Wyatt, daughter of John Wyatt of Ipswich. Joseph and Sarah had nine children. 69

According to Perley's "Dwelling of Boxford", Joseph moved from Ipswich to Rowley in 1660 and became a leading citizen of that village. It was nick-named "Rowdy Village" by some. Joseph was one of the men to petition the colony to charter Rowdey under the new name of Boxford and his name appears on the charter. He served for a period as Constable of Boxford which was an office of considerable local stature in those times. He established an iron works at Boxford in partnership with his sons and profited considerably from the venture.

Joseph's indenture was not terminated until March 22, 1689 when he was approaching 70 years of age. However, he must have enjoyed considerable freedom from his master in view of his accomplishments. It may have been that the "master and servant" did not bother to attend to the legal process of voiding the indenture until Joseph's advanced years.70

Joseph made his will November 11, 1699 and died April 19, 1700. His wife Sarah (Wyatt) Bixby died June 3, 1704 at age 84.

II Daniel Bixby

Daniel Bixby was born at Ipswich, Massachusetts, about 1651 and died at Andover, Massachusetts, 7 May 1717, leaving a will dated 12 April, 1715, proved 5 July 1717. He married 2 December 1674, **Hannah Chandler** the daughter of **Lieut. Thomas Chandler** and **Hannah (Brewer) Chandler.** Daniel had moved to Andover prior to his marriage. He was a husbandman and carpenter. His father-in-law was one of the influential men of Andover and had been one of the early settlers there. Thomas Chandler conveyed to his son-in-law sixty acres near the Shawshin river, 12 April 1688, the consideration being 40 pounds.

III. Mephibosheth Bixby

Mephibosheeth Bixby was born 3 April 1690 at Andover, Massachusetts and died 20 March 1767 at Winchendon, Massachusetts. He married 28 May 1713, **Mary Emmons** the daughter of **Thomas and Mary (Hancock) Emmons**⁷² of Cambridge, Massachusetts. Mephibosheth removed from Andover to Woburn, Massachusetts in April 1724 and then to Shrewsbury where he bought 30 acres of land. Miss Charlotte Abbott of Andover wrote, "It is amusing to see how the town clerks of Andover struggled with the name Mephibosheth. In 1716 it was called Phebe, 1717 Phib, 1720 Mephib, Mephebesh and Febesheth. In 1722 an educated man took charge and cut the poor fellow down to Mepheb and in 1723 to Meb. In 1724 the name does not appear on the record." His death record at Winchendon is under the name Mesebuth.

IV. Samuel Bixby

Samuel Bixby was born 31 August, 1716, at Andover, Massachussetts. He died 12 March, 1800, aged 84 years at Boylston, ⁷³ Massachusetts. He married MARY BUCK of Woburn, whose marriage to Samuel Bigbee is recorded at Woburn, November 1737. She was probably the daughter of John and Priscilla Buck of Woburn, and born there 2 October, 1712. ⁷⁴ In February 1740 he was sued in Westford for debt. Failing to satisfy the judgment he was thrown into jail at Worcester, June, 1741. ⁷⁵ He returned to Shrewsbury and was living there in 1745, but in 1758 was of Lancaster. His intention of marriage was recorded in Lancaster, 8 October, 1773 to his 2nd wife, Sarah Beaman of Lancaster, widow. ⁷⁶ Sarah died at Boylston 21 January 1800, aged 88 years. Samuel was a member of the train band of Capt. Jabez Beamen of Shrewsbury, 7 April, 1757.

V. John Bixby, Sr.

John Bixby (Samuel, Mephibosheth, Daniel, Joseph), was born 5 March, 1747, at Shrewsbury, Massachusetts. He died later than 1819 when he was a resident of West Boylston, Massachusetts. He married 1769 (intention, 4 February, 1769 at Princeton, Massachusetts), **Mary Flood** or **Floyd**, of Princeton.⁷⁷

John made application for a pension 10 September, 1818, declaring that he was a resident of West Boylston, aged seventy one years, and was infirm: that he enlisted in January, 1781 and served until December 1783. He was honorably discharged, but had lost his papers. ⁷⁸

Although he makes no mention of his service prior to 1780, it appears from Massachusetts Revolutionary rolls that he enlisted 11 July, 1775 to serve until 31 December, 1775. He reenlisted 10 February 1779 for three years to the credit of the town of Shrewsbury. On the 30 November, 1779 he was reported invalided. On an earlier roll of May, 1779 he was reported as sick at Shrewsbury and in October 1779 as stationed at Boston. He was also credited with an enlistment for six months from 3 July to 13 December 1780 and for a three years enlistment from 20 January 1781.

John was described in July 1780 when he was 33 years of age as five feet nine inches tall with a light complexion. He was a farmer and resident of Shrewsbury.

VI. John Bixby, Jr.

John Bixby was born 3 February 1777 at Shrewsbury, Massachusetts and married 26 January 1798 at Princeton, Massachsetts, **Mary 'Polly' Davis,** daughter of **Josiah and Miriam Davis.** He died 27 September 1866 in Sylvania, Columbia Township, Bradford County, Pennsylvania.

John moved to Vermont where he lived for awhile. Then moved to Pennsylvania probably about 1819 where he lived for the rest of his life. The farm which he owned is still in possession of descendants. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church at Troy, Pa. When he settled there part of Pennsylvania was a wild country as is shown by the following; "Shorly after his coming there he had to be away over night and Mrs. Bixby had a girl staying with her. In the night they were awakened by heavy footsteps on the roof. There was no sleep that night for Mrs. Bixby. In the morning a neighbor followed the tracks and killed the bear that had been walking on the roof."

Horace Emery Bixby was born 26 March 1887 in Beloit, Kansas, the son of **Emory Pierce Bixby and Alice Estelle Douglass.** Although his father's middle name was spelled with an o, Horace's middle name was registered as Emery. He spent his early years on his father's farm and went on to college at Kansas State Agricultural college where he received a degree in electrical engineering. After graduation he worked for the Santa Fe Railroad as an electrician and then taught mathematics at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia where he met **Hallie M. Smith** daughter of **Benoni Wright Smith and Lydia Myra (Brunt) Smith.** They were married 28 August 1911 in Manhattan, Kansas. He was then employed by the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation as electrical engineer at the Minidoka project on the Snake River at Lake Walcott, Idaho and at the cessation of the job at Minidoka Dam they moved to Burley and he and two of his friends formed the Burley Electric Co. and





after a number of years moved on to Portland, Oregon where he was with the Portland Railway, Light and Power Company. They bought a house in Multnamah where they lived until 1931 when he started working with the U.S Indian Service to operate the power system in Polson, Montana until the job was finished in 1942 and they moved back to the Multnomah house where he went back to work for Bonneville Power Administration. In 1944 he was transferred to Sacramento, California where he worked for the Sacramento Valley-Shasta project and was there until his death in 1945.

I. Nathaniel Bowman

Nathaniel Bowman was born in England in 1608 the son of **Robert and Anna (Barnard) Bowman**. The family originated near Kirk-Oswald, Carlisle. The earliest church records of Kirk-Oswald were destroyed. Nathaniel came to Watertown, Massachusetts about 1630. He applied to be admitted freeman, 19 October 1630; but his name is not on the list of those admitted, but it is on the earliest list of proprietor (February 1636/37), "then inhabiting" Watertown. He moved--time not ascertained--to Cambridge Farms (Lexington) where he bought land of Edward Goffe. He married Anna Barnard, and she probably died first as no mention is made of her in his will.

The will of "Nathaniel Bowman, of Cambridge, gentleman," dated 21 October 1679, proved 4 April 1682, gives to son Francis the "farm in Cambridge, where I now dwell, which farm I purchased of Edward Goffe, &c., With dwelling-house, &c.; said Francis to pay the other legacies, viz.: to son Nathaniel £25, to be paid four years after my death; if he die without lawful issue, to revert to the children of Francis. To Docas March, and her heirs, £50; to gr. children, Nathaniel and Benjamin Blackleach, £25 each, to be paid when 21 years old; to gr. daughter, Hannah Turner £15 at 18 yrs. old, or at marriage, which, with what her parents had would make a full share. In each case, on failure of heirs, the legacies to revert to the children of son Francis, who was sole executor.

By will, dated 1744, he directed his wife Ruth to take as her own proper estate forever three of his Negro servants,--"Batiss, Philliss and Pompy, so named." He gave also to his granddaughter Ruth Bowman, full power at his decease to take his Negro boy Domini "to be her own forever," she to pay her brother Francis 20 pounds, old tenor, at the time of "receiving Domini." He filled from time to time every office in the gift of the people. He was on the committee in 1693 to purchase land for the support of the ministry, on the first board of selectmen and assessors under the town organization, and frequently reelected. He represented the town in the General Court, six years and was also one of the royal magistrates, appointed first in 1720. In seating the meeting house he was one of those "plaft at ye tabl!" and his wife "was plaft In ye forefeatt in ye Bodye of feats."

BROOKS ANCESTRY

I. Thomas Brooks⁸⁹

Thomas Brooks, of Concord, Massachusetts, died there May 21, 1667; his wife Grace, whose surname is unknown died May 12, 1664. BULLOCK ANCESTRY¹⁰⁴



There are several opinions held as to the origin of the Scottish Bullock (Bulloch) family. A.H. Miller in the Scottish Historical Review claims it descends from Sir William Bullock, Edward Baliol's chamberlain, an ecclesiastic and a man of great military talents. A number of persons of prominence of the name in Scotland are: Richard Bullock, who was slain on the field of Cambok; Thomas Bullock, who was warden in Berwick, 1311-12; Sir John Bullock, Bishop of Ross about 1490; William Bullock, Provost of Haddington in 1330; Walter Bullock, who was one of the retinue that crossed with Princess Margaret of Norway when she was sought in marriage by King Eric in 1281; and others.

Another concept advanced is that the Bullock (Bulloch) family descended from the ancient name of Bullo in Peebles. A member of this line went to Glasgow, as was the custom with younger sons who had to leave home and seek occupations elsewhere. Many went to the cities to earn their livelihood. It is contended that all those names ending in O, usually affixed, as was the custom in vogue, a "ch", so that the name of Bullo was changed to that of Bulloch. However, the name Bulloch really seems to have originated from the Gallic word <u>bealach</u> and hence he who lived at this location was called <u>Balloch</u>. We find the name <u>Bulloch</u>, and <u>Bullock</u> spelled either way in the records, and in reference to the same individual

It appears that the Bullochs and Bullocks of Scotland and the United States, claim descent from the famous warrior Donald Balloch, a grandson of John McDonald, Lord of the Isles, who married Lady Margaret Stewart, daughter of King Robert II of Scotland

The progenitor of William Bullock can be distinctly traced back to the time of the Norman Conquest in 1066 and some 300 years before the time of the introduction of surnames into England. We find the name and the coat of arms of the family in English History. The insignia upon the shield are "Three Bulls Heads" and above the shield a crest of fine battle axes with the motto, "nil conscire sibe". In 1635, three brothers, Henry, Edward, and Richard Bullock, emigrated from England and settled in Salem, Massachusetts. Richard Bullock removed to Rehoboth, Massachusetts in 1647.

Richard Bullock was born in 1622 in Essex, England and his parentage is uncertain He emigrated to this country with his older brothers Henry and Edward before he was 21 and stayed with or near them until he received his patrimony when he came of age. They settled in Salem, Massachusetts. He removed to Rehoboth, Mass. in 1643 where he married 4 August 1647, Elizabeth Ingraham the daughter of Richard Ingraham of Rehoboth and Northampton, Mass. and descendant of Sir Arthur Ingraham and Elizabeth Wignail of Watertown. She was born about 1630 and died 7 January 1659. They had six children. Richard married second, Elizabeth Billington daughter of Francis and Christian (Penn) Billington¹⁰⁷ and grand-daughter of John Billington who arrived in New England on the Mayflower. II. SAMUEL BULLOCK¹⁰⁸

(Richard)

Deacon Samuel Bullock was born 19 August 1648, in Rehoboth, Massachusetts the eldest son of Richard and Elizabeth Ingraham Bullock. He was a large proprietary in the Rehoboth lands and one of the first purchasers of the Swanzey lands. He is believed to have lived in Swanzey for a time. In 1675-6 he contributed liberally to defraying the expenses of King Phillip's War. In 1696 he was chosen a representative to the General Court. He and his wife Thankful were active members of Reverend John Wyle's church and Samuel was for many years and up to his death, a Deacon thereof. He married first, Mary Thurber, daughter of John and Priscilla Thurber. She died on October 4, 1674 at the birth of their only child, who also did not survive. He married secondly, Thankful Reneff (or Rouse). Samuel died in Rehoboth on 10 March 1717 at the age of 69.

III. SAMUEL BULLOCK, Jr.

(Samuel, Richard)

Samuel Bullock, Jr. 109 was born at the old homestead of his father, just north of Miller Bridge on Palmer's River in Rehoboth, 1683 November 7 and died there in April 1746 He married 21 June 1711, Anna Salisbury of Swansey. She is said to have been born in 1687 and died 21 June 1771. She was a daughter of William and Anna (Cole) Salisbury. Anna Cole was born at Kickernuit, Warren, 1664 and was a daughter of the first Hugh Cole, and aunt of the Anna Cole who married Hugh Bullock of Ebenezer. In 1735, Samuel is called Lieutenant. He seems to have been not only a farmer but to have had a saw and grist mill and also to have kept a store in company with his brothers, Seth and Micheal. They owned a boat and traded with parties at Mistol and Newport going down Palmers. An old memorandum book, contains entries made by him showing he was in 1711-12 the Superintendent in building the Second Congregational Church which was erected on the first hill just north of the "Shad" (?) or Orleans factory. He writes that it was raised 3 July 1751. A burial ground was laid out on the same lot, and there he and his father, and his only son, William and his grandson, Samuel, with many of their families were buried. This Second Church was probably not completed until 1721 when the First or old Newman Church on Seekouk (?) Place gave the Second Church their old pulpit and the facings on their gallery. This Church stood till 1777 when a new one was built just west of Rehoboth Village about 2 miles northeasterly from the former building. In 1728, Samuel (3) was one of three (----) to loan the town's portion of \$60,000 in the Provincial Treasury. In 1746 he served in Capt. Wheelers Company. His memorandum book, speaks of the dark day in 1732 when he writes, "It was so smokey all day that it clouded ye sun, so that you might behold ye (-----) of the sun with ye naked eye, as well as to behold ye moon. And that day our Diner of Squash was so bitter that after it was well buttered the Dog would not eat it.". He records also the "coming of the locust out of the ground" 18 May 1716. And also the "appearing of a Stong Light of a red firey color in the N. East on the evening of 11 Dec. 1719", and also a "Mighty storm of wind and rain" on 16 Sept, 1727, and of a "Mighty Earthquake heard",29 Oct, 1727. The same record book contains the names of men who worked in 1711-12 in building the second meeting house, and the amounts paid them. He had three known children, whose names he records as Althea, William, and Anne.

IV. WILLIAM BULLOCK¹¹¹

(Samuel, Samuel, Richard)

Colonel William Bullock, son of Samuel and Anna Salisbury Bullock, was born 29 April 1716 and died 10 December 1810 in his 95th year. He married 19 February 1737 Susannah Kent daughter of Joshua and Mary (Toogood) Kent of Barrington. Susanna was born 22 January 1716 and died 4 July 1780. She was a sister of the Josiah who married William's sister, Althea Bullock. William, being an only son, large landed property from his father along the valley of Palmers River, mostly on its west side, which was later divided into four farms and owned by his sons, Samuel, Calvin and Kent. In 1772, William was Colonel of the regiment made up of companies of militia from Rehoboth and adjoining towns and was ever afterwards known as Col. Bullock. He not only superintended his large farm but he also was a surveyor, and surveyed the town of Savoy in north western Massachusetts granted by that state to the soldiers who served in Capt. Gallops company in the French and Indian wars. His grandson, Nathaniel who was 33 years of age when William died, stated that he was tall in stature, well proportioned, of erect mien, dignified in manner and of unusually commanding presence. He was a man of influence, and possessed the esteem and confidence of his fellow citizens through his long life.

V. WILLIAM BULLOCK, Jr.

Captain William Bullock¹¹³, was born in Rehoboth, Massachusetts, 26 March 1743, the son of Colonel William and Susannah (Kent) Bullock. He died 17 August 1785 Guilford, Vermont and was buried at Old North Blanchard Cemetery, Guilford. He removed from Rehoboth, to Guilford with his brother Capt. Lovell in 1762/64 when Samuel Nichols, yeoman, deeded lot 133 drawn in right of William Johnson, 100 acres to Lovell Bullock, cordwainer, for 16 pounds. The brothers lived on lot 133, clearing land and erecting buildings until Lovell deeded the lot to William. He was a farmer, soldier and town official. He saw service in the Continental Army at Valley Forge and White Plains. Capt. Bullock owned a distillery and mill at east Guilford where the Levi Boyden mill and later Smith and Hunt's baby carriage shop was located. In 1770 William deeded to Lovell the mill and grist mill. He married 29 September 1764 at Petersham, Massachusetts, Miriam Whitney She was born 31 July 1751, daughter of Soloman and Elizabeth (Smith) Whitney. She died at Guilford 29 January 1825 and was buried at Old North Cemetery.

Francis Cooke came from Blyth, Notts, England with his wife Hester Mahiew, who was a resident for a time at Canterbury, Kent. He came to Plymouth, Massachusetts as a passenger on the Mayflower in 1620. They had been married June 30, 1603 in Leyden, Holland. Francis was born probably after August 1583. He was a member of Robinson's congregation and the 17th signer of the Mayflower Compact. He was called a "woodcomber". Francis and his son John were the first to arrive with Hester and other children following later. He died in 1663 at about eighty one years of age.

John Cooke was about thirteen years old when he arrived at Plymouth with his father in 1620 on the Mayflower. He married the 28th of March 1634, Sarah Warren, the daughter of the Pilgrims, Richard and Elizabeth Warren of the Mayflower. John became a deacon of the Plymouth Church in the 1630's, but was excommunicated from the church around 1757 and became a Baptist preacher and about 1680 established a Baptist church in what is now Tiverton. No precisely comparable deed exists for the properties contributed on behalf of the bride, but two years earlier her father, Stephen Hopkins, had died, and the bulk of his estate was "Devided equally" by his overseers among the surviving children. The items designated as "Damaris porcon" can be taken to represent what she was able to bring to her marriage. They seem, moreover, representative of many bride's portions of this period---and hence of the kind and range of domestic equipment with which an average couple would attempt to set up housekeeping. The value of the whole inheritance is a little over nine pounds. This seems less than the sum of the various properties promised by the groom's father, but it would not be wise to draw a general inference here. The details of any marriage settlement corresponded to the particular circumstances of the families involved, and the contributions from each side reflected, the ability to pay.

IV. SAMUEL EDSON¹²⁶

(Thomas, Thomas, Richard)

Samuel Edson came of a family of excellent ability and standing, and of good substance. He received an education appropriate to his status, including through work on his father's farm, skill in agriculture. Fillongley, his home, was in Warwickshire. The Earl of Warwick was interested in aiding the New England Company, which was organized to promote colonization in Massachusetts Bay. Accordingly, many young people of the rural districts of Warwickshire became interested in emigrating, and some of these did settle at Salem in 1628, and a larger body in 1629, and a charter for the colony of Massachusetts Bay was granted to them in March, 1629. Very enthusiastic reports were received back as to this new land, and larger groups joined them from year to year. During this period, Samuel Edson was in his teens and early twenties. In 1638, a settler from the colony of Massachusetts Bay arrived in Fillongley and reported glowingly on the opportunities for settlers there. Samuel Edson, then 25 years old, saw in such a move an opportunity for his immediate marriage to Susanna Orcutt, whose family had long been in Warwichshire. Accordingly, they were married that year, and in late May or early June sailed, arriving at Salem about the middle of July, where they were heartily welcomed by their friends and acquaintances from Warwickshire who had settled there. In 1655 they moved from Salem to the Duxbury Plantation, named Bridgewater five years after he went there. Before his death he had acquired a very large estate by his persevering industry and vigilant enterprise, and held many local and other responsible offices and became the common ancestor of one of the most numerous, popular and respected families in Bridgewater.

Hawley Ancestry

A green plot in the North of England, is called a haw: in Scotland, a small bit of ground, a haugh. Ley, lea and leaz are old Saxon words for a field or award. Someone, once upon a time, or before time was, the knowing ones tell us, lived in a small green field. He had no surname, no one had, but, assuming airs---perhaps he had inherited some money--he chose a name. What more appropriate than haw-leaz--or, if a Scotsman, haugh-leaz, or lea? His friends and neighbors were requested to address him as Mr. Haugh-Leaz--"a hyphen, if you please."

The name looks well--quite imposing, indeed. But friends and neighbors--especially friends--sometimes feel called upon to discipline you for your good. "Haugh-Leaz, Esq.," was too grand; the name might engender pride. So they wrote him down Hauleigh, or Hawles, or Haylea, or Haley, or Haulley, or Haylea, finally arriving at Hawley. The name has also appeared in old documents as de la Haye, and de la Hagh. This means "of the hedge," or, freely rendered, living near a hedge. This may have been the first form of Hawley. Hay, haye, or have, are old Saxon for hedge. Names perhaps derived from this root are Hay, Hayes, Haynes, Hawes, Haworth, Hawton, Haywood, Hayward, Heywood, Hayland, Roundhay, and Lyndshay

Chaucer used haw for a farmyard, and church-hawe is church-yard.

In Kent there is a village named Hayeleigh, and we find seats of the Hawleys in Kent--Leybourne Grange--as well as in Somerset and Derbyshire. The home in Kent is near that of the nobleman who had the following ambiguous notice posted up:

"Notice is hereby given that the Marquis of Camden on account of the backwardness of the harvest, will not shoot himself nor any of his tenants till the 14th of September."

Walter de Hauleigh is the first of the Hawley family of whom record is preserved, and of him we know but little. He was member of Parliament in the year of grace 1377.

Thomas Hawley, messenger of the bedchamber to Henry VIII., was with that monarch at the Field of the Cloth of Gold. He was appointed king of arms and herald, with the title, Clarenceux King of Arms. His heraldic Visitation of Essex, Surrey, and Hampshire, or a copy, is in the British Museum.

Sir Francis Hawley raised a troop of horses, at his own expense, for Charles I., who created him a baronet-Baron Hawley. Henry C. Hawley, brigadier-general, was second in command of cavalry at Fontenoy in 1745, succeeding to the command upon the death of the superior officer. He was in command at Ghent, and, according to Horace Walpole, frightened the magistrates out of their wits by kicking downstairs a messenger sent with a bribe. In his will, which is an eccentric one, he asks for a funeral without ostentation. "I will have no show any more than if a poor soldier. Written with my own hand, because I have a poor opinion of the law." Benjamin Hawley was aide to Lord Hill at Waterloo.

The Hawleys have always loved books, many being veritable bookworms. There was Sir Joseph Hawley, born in 1813, a noted turfman, who won many a race with his thoroughbreds. He was devoted to books, and left the most valuable library in Kent. The Shakespeare scholar and librarian of the memorable library at Stratford-on-Avon was Frederick Hawley, born 1827. He made a catalogue of all the known editions of Shakespeare's plays in every language—the most complete catalogue in existence.

KEITH ANCESTRY

The following is from "KEITH KINFOLKS", by Larry King "GENESIS AND GENERAL HISTORY OF THE KEITHS"

The Keiths are descendants of an ancient warlike people of Germany in the country of Hesse. They were known as the Chattie or Cattie. They resisted the Roman Conquest until finally the overpowering legions of Augustus Caesar defeated them. A part of the Chattie submitted to the terms of peace and remained in the country. The rest considered this submission dishonorable and abandoned the country. They went to Batavia (now Holland) and lived there a few years.

The natives of Batavia were afraid of a people they heard were so warlike and whom they observed to be industrious and thriving. Consequently they gave them orders to leave their country and seek one more spacious and less populous.

The Chattie refused to return to Hesse, now possessed by the Romans, but agreed to leave if provided with ships. Being given ships, they set sail about 50 AD with their families and were forced by a storm upon different courses. Some landed at the mouth of the Thames River in England. But the greater number were driven by the tempest to the northern part of Scotland and landed in a country which ever since has been called Chattness or Caithness.

The Scots were alarmed at the arrival of a people trained in war, denied them a share of their country and commended them to depart. The Chattie refused to leave and defeated the Scots in the battle which followed. They settled over the coast country and increased. Their number and power raised the jealousy and envy of the Scots who marched against them with a great army. The Chattie were driven to Lochaber District of southern Iverness and neighboring mountainous shires where they spread into the famous McIntosh, McPherson and other clans.

The Chattie continued to be a distinct people from the Scots and were governed by their own prince and laws until about 1005 AD. Eventually the Scots observed them to be a just and hard working people and made peace with them.

The Danes had overrun England and were marching on Scotland. At the Battle of Camus Town in 1010 the Danes were defeated. In that battle Robert, Chief of the Chattie, slew the commander of the Danes in personal combat. For that feat King Malcolm II of Scotland bestowed on him several lands, including the Barony of Keith in East Lothian from which he and his descendants assumed their Keith surname. The King also appointed him hereditary Great Marischals of Scotland, which high office continued in the Keith Family until the year 1715 at which time the last Earl engaged in the Jacobite Rebellion and forfeited his estate. The office of Great Marischals had been in the Keith Family for over 700 years.

The seat of the Office was Dunnottar Castle on the Kincardineshire Coast; on an over four acres promontory rising 160 feet and surrounded on three sides by the North Sea. It was reputed to be the strongest fortification in Scotland. During the war with England the Royal Jewels of Scotland were brought there for safekeeping.

In the unsuccessful Jacobite Rebellion the Keith Family took the side of those rebelling against the Government. They were defeated in the Battle of Sheriff Muir (only battle fought). A great many not killed in battle were imprisoned, some were executed, their property confiscated, they were deprived of their titles, some fled to other countries including the American Colonies, others were deported to England and Dunnottar Castle was dismantled. The old castle in ruins continues to be one of the show placed of Scotland. Many tales are told of the sacrifices and devotion of its defenders. Readers may wish to consult an encyclopedia for more details on the early Keith Families who occupied Dunnottar Castle for so many years and the high offices held by them.

During research for this Work no evidence was found definitely linking the Keiths recorded in this Book with the first Keiths discussed above. James Keith, Sr., the first recorded and ancestor of those following arrived in America from North England as a child after the Jacobite Rebellion. It then would be reasonable to conclude that he was a descendant of these ancient Keiths and very possibly was brought to America by fleeing relatives escaping punishment for their parts in the Rebellion.

Many Keiths immigrated to America from the British Isles before, at the time of and after the Jacobite Rebellion. The Keith name is fairly common in the United States.

The Office of Marischall

The office of Marischall was hereditary in the family of Keith, & was the second in rank in Scotland, being next to that of the Constable of the Kingdom. He was heritable keeper of the Regalia, and on the morning of the opening of Parliament conveyed them from the Castle of Edinburgh where they were usually kept, to the Palace of Holyroad, & on the rising of Parliament he rode on the left hand of the king, & his guards had charge

within the inner doors of the House, where he sat at a table along with the Constable, having the crown and scepter lying before them. He also held a court called the Marischall Court, for deciding all differences relating to the laws of honor & arms.

The Marischall's badge of office was a baton ornamented with thistles, having on the top an imperial crown. It was after the forfeiture of the family, gifted by George, the tenth & last Earl Marischall, the intimate friend of Frederick the Great of Prussia to Marischall College, Aberdeen, founded by his ancestor George, the fifth Earl in 1593.

The last sitting of the Scottish Parliament took place, on the 6th of June, 1651. The Regalia was delivered over to its heritable keeper, William the seventh Earl Marischall to be lodged in the almost impregnable Castle of Donnottar, situated on the rockbound coast of Kincardineshire, and near to Stonehaven. This remote fortress with its strong towers and fortifications covered about four acres of ground. It had long been the property of the family of Keith Earls Marischall of Scotland, and had been handed down from father to son for a period of three hundred years, being then in the possession of William, the seventh Earl of that name.

About the end of the fourteenth century it passed into the hands of Sir William Keith, Great Marischall of Scotland.

I. JAMES KEITH¹³⁴

Rev. James Keith was born in 1644, the son of Robert Keith of Aberdeen, Scotland. He was educated at Aberdeen (as tradition says at the expense of a maiden aunt). At the age of 18 he emigrated to this country. Arriving in Boston in 1662, he was introduced to the church in Bridgewater by Dr. Increase Mather. He is referred to in the records of the church "as a student of divinity, having some competent time improved his gifts amongst them, in the work of the ministry, and having also due approbation, by the testimony of the Reverend Elders of other churches of Christ, to whom he was known." His settlement took place February 18 1664, upon the following terms: "A double house lot of twelve (12) acres, with a house built thereon, a purchase right, so-called, being a fifty-sixth part of the original grant; and 40 pounds annual salary, 20 pounds in Boston money and the other half at home." Many and persistent efforts have been made to trace the direct ancestry of the Rev. James Keith, but thus far without avail.

The text selected for his first sermon was from Jeremiah 1:6--"Behold I cannot speak, for I am a child;" and was said to have been delivered from a rock in the "mill pasture" near the river. His advice and influence with the civil authorities of the colony, seem to have been considerable; instanced in the case of King Philip's wife and son, when the question as to what should be done with the son was in agitation, he stated in a letter to Rev. Mr. Cotton, "that he was in favor of mercy," and differing from most others, had great weight, if indeed it was not decisive in sparing the boy's life.

He preached the sermon at the dedication of the new meeting house in South Bridgewater, in 1717, two years only before his death, which was printed in the Bridgewater Monitor and contained some pertinent and impressive remarks on the subject of intemperance. "Besides other evils" said he, " which might be mentioned, I would refer particularly to that of intemperance; the excessive and prodigious expense upon strong drink; above all that of rum, the scandalous and horrible abuser of which threatens ruin unto this land and to this place; a ruin to all our dearest interests, both civil and religious. If there be any such houses among you, as I fear there are, that vend that strong drink contrary to the law of God and the wholesome laws of this province, let such of you as are vested with civil power and stand obliged unto the oath of God, see that such grievous profanation be suppressed, lest that iniquity, the abuse of rum be our ruin."

Israel Keith lived in Easton, Massachsetts, originally. He was educated at Harvard and later entered into business in Boston. At the start of the Revolution he enlisted in the Militia and was made assistant adjutant general. After the war he moved to Pittsford, Vermont where he ran a country store, Inn and manufactured iron. In 1798 Israel and his brother, Alfred, came to Sheldon where they soon set up a blast furnace for smelting iron. The furnace was on the east side of Black Creek. This was one of the first such furnaces in the state. They operated in this location one year,1822-1823, then rebuilt on the opposite side of the Creek. Here they continued the business for a number of years. The primary products were potash kettles of 45, 60 and 90 gallon capacity. Because of the size of the operation the iron ore was called "Sheldon Currency". It was said that men came from a distance of 200 miles and waited in line to take the kettles hot from the molds. About 100 men were employed to manufacture the articles made at the furnace. It has been noted that stoves and hollow ware were in great demand as were griddles and iron teakettles. Isreal and Alfred also were active in the operation of a starch factory, grist mill and store. It has been said that a great portion of the business activities of those early days was due to the ability and industry of the Keith Brothers.

GRACE EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Grace Episcopal Church, Sheldon, Vermont was organized in 1816 by Rev Stephen Beach who was the first rector. The second church was a brick building built in 1853 on land donated by Alfred Keith which was then replaced by the present building in 1878. Alfred Keith also contributed a large expense for this church which seats 150 persons and cost \$5000, valued at \$6000. in 1883. Alfred Keith was the first Senior Warden and one of the original sixteen members with Rev. A.H. Bailey, rector

The Rev. Reuel Keith, D.D. was for many years an eminent Biblical professor in the Theological Seminary at Alexandria in Virginia, which he founded. He spent his last days with his brother, Cyrus in the parish of the Grace Episcopal Church in Sheldon, Vt. where his remains rest in the cemetery of the church. ¹⁴² Cleveland, his son, was a missionary appointed to the mission in China June, 1851. He was married in the spring of 1854 to Caroline P. Tenney who was sent to the same mission in March, 1850. She died on the way home at San Francisco July 10 1862 and Cleveland was on the "Golden Gate" which was burned between San Francisco and New York, which sailed July 21, 1862. He was drowned in attempting to reach the shore.

A month before Abby was married in 1841, her father gave her a diary in which she continued to write over the years of her busy life, caring for her family, making calls on her friends and neighbors, tending to her garden and household chores. Her husband, Merriman who was a doctor, was often away from home caring for his patients and Abby at times was frustrated by her own illnesses and those close to her. After Merriman died (June 5, 1885) she lived with her son, Edwin Merrriman who had practised medicine with his father. She died June 21, 1912 and her diaries were given to her children. Many of



Abby Keith Brown (1820-1912) Diaries, 1841-1908

Introduction

The Abby Keith Brown diaries were a gift to the Vermont Historical Society from the writer's great-granddaughter, Carolyn (Brown) North. Ms. North's transcriptions accompany the diaries (ms. acc. no. 90.30). In 2000, Barbara (Brown) Bixby, another great granddaughter, gave Abby Brown's diary for 1841-1855 which she transcribed and indexed (ms 2000.4). The collection occupies 2.25 linear feet of shelf space and fills five boxes.



Biographical Sketch

Apart from what is recorded in the diaries, little is known about Abby Keith Brown's life. An undated photocopy of her obituary states that she was born in 1820 in Sheldon, Vermont, and "had always lived in this town" (MSA 102:1). She was the daughter of Oliver Allen Keith (b. June 27, 1783) and Martha Brooks (dates?) who were married February 10, 1819(?).

Abby Keith married Amasa Merriman Brown November 21, 1841, in Sheldon. Amasa Brown was born in Canada, graduated from the Dartmouth Medical School in 1840, and settled in Sheldon that same year. He held a number of positions in the community and was elected to the Vermont General Assembly in 1854. He was also a physician for forty years.

The Browns had five children: Sarah Elizabeth (b. February 15, 1843), Oliver Keith (b. July 28, 1845), Martha Caroline (b. January 22, 1850), Edwin Merriman (December 5, 1855-February. 5, 1935); and Alfred Keith (May 14, 1858-1896,

Edwin Merriman Brown married Fannie L. Comings (1859-1941) of Berkshire on October 6, 1881. Their son, Fred Comings Brown (1884-1955), and Lucy Holmes (d. 1918) were parents of Carolyn Brown (1915-), who married William North. Ms. North notes in correspondence to the VHS (August 9, 1994) that she was born in St. Albans in 1915 and lived with her "Grandma Brown". Barbara Bixby is the daughter of Rockwood Smith Brown and the granddaughter of Alfred Keith Brown.

Scope and Content

The collection consists of diaries kept by Abby Keith Brown (June 11, 1820-June 21, 1912) over a period of sixty-seven years when she lived in Sheldon, Vermont, where her husband, Amasa Merriman Brown (June 22, 1812-June 5, 1885), was a physician. She began her diary before her marriage, and continued it into her declining years as a grandmother and widow when she made her home with her son Edwin Merriman Brown (December 5, 1855-February 5, 1935), who practiced medicine with his father.

Abby Brown's daily entries for 1841 often fill a page of her journal, but she gradually writes less; she compresses the years 1845, 1846 and 1850 for example, into a paragraph or two. Her general style is a brief daily entry and in her writing the reader sees the pattern of life for a late-nineteenth-century woman in a rural Vermont village: the repetition of housework and other chores; the frustration with her own periods of ill health as well as that of those close to her; concern for her family and gossip of neighbors; and the particulars of her sewing projects, which included quilting in her later years.

Thomas Makepeace was born in 1593 in Bristol Somerset England. His name in this country, first appears in 1637 in a book called a "Transcript of Boston Records", stating that Mr. Thomas Makepeace shall have a house plot and garden place. In 1638 he became one of the original members of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company which was established that year. Thomas Makepeace appears to have been a person of some consequence, and of considerable wealth. It appears he lived at Dorchester when he married the 25th of May 1641, Mrs. Elizabeth Mellows, a widow. He died in Boston January or February 1667.

MASON ANCESTRY¹⁵⁷

I. Capt. Hugh Mason

Capt. Hugh Mason, the progenitor of many bearing that name and who are widely scattered over the United States, was born at Maldon, Co. Essex, England, about 1605, and died at Watertown, Massachusetts, October 10, 1678. He married at St. Peter's Parish, Maldon, January 13, 1632, Hester Wells, baptized there July 21, 1611, died Watertown, May 21 1692, youngest daughter of Thomas "The Glover' and Helen (Siday) Wells. On an old shipping record is noted "Hugh Mason, tanner, aged 28, with his wife Hester, aged 22, sailed from Ipswich, Co. Suffolk, England, April 1634, for America, in the ship Francis, Mr. John Cutting." Its destination was probably Boston, as it was then considered the port of entry for New England. He and his wife took the Oath of Allegiance which was required before embarkation. Upon his arrival he settled at Watertown and became a prominent and valuable member of that colony.

I. GEORGE MINOT

(Thomas)

George Minot, the second son of Thomas and Anne Minot, baptized in the Parish Church of Saint Mary the, Saffron Walden, Essex, England, emigrated to New England to join the Dorchester Company, which sailed from Plymouth, 20 March, 1630, reaching Dorchester, 30 May 1630, old style. (The name of the vessel he came in is not known with certainty, but is believed to have been the "Mary and John." He became a freeman of the Colony, 1 April 1634. His position in Dorchester was one of prominence, as on the 28th October 1634, he was one of ten men chosen to order the affairs of the Dorchester plantation, and in the spring of 1636 he was one of the deputies to the General Court to order the affairs of the Colony of Massachusetts Bay. His connection with the church was also a prominent one, his name being third among the seven who signed the covenant on the 23 August 1636. He died after many years service as ruling elder, 24 December 1671.

II. Capt. JOHN MINOT

(George, Thomas)

John Minot was not made a freeman until 1665: this delay being due to his persistence in refaining from membership in the church, which was a qualification for a freeman. In 1660 a controversy arose regarding the baptism of John Minot's children, and two pages of the church record book are devoted to arguments on the matter. But 3 August 1664, the General Court passed an order repealing the said qualification as to being a church member, and 3 May 1665 John became a freeman. He died 12 August 1669 at the early age of 43 years. In his will provision was made for his father, who survived him, and the widow and children—John the eldest, Stephen, to be placed at a trade, James to be kept at learning, and Samuel to be brought up as a husbandman.

III. JAMES MINOT

(John, George, Thomas)

Capt. James Minot graduated at Harvard College in 1675, and afterward studied physic and divinity. He preached at Stow at various times between 1685 and 1692. Appointed a Justice of the Peace, he also held the office of Captain in the militia and Representative to the General Court. The pitaphs on the two gravestones erected to his memory and that of his wife, now standing in the "Hill Burying Ground" in Concord, read as follows:

Here is interred the body of Mrs. Rebecca Minott ye virtuous consort of James Minott Esq. (and daughter of Capt. Timothy Wheeler). She was a person of serious piety and abounding charity, of great usefulness in her day and a pattern of patience and holy submission under a long confinement, and resigned her soul with joy in her redeemer Sept. 23, 1734, Age 68.

Here is interred the remains of James Minott, Esq., A man excelling grammarian, enriched with the gift of prayer and preaching, a commanding officer, a physician of great value, a great lover of peace as well as of justice, and which was his greatest glory, a gent'n of distinguished virtue and goodness, happy in a virtuous posterity, and living religiously, died comfortably, Sept. 20 1735, age 83.

Experience Mitchell was one of the forefathers, (a name usually applied to those, who arrived in the three first ships) and came over in the third ship, the Ann in 1623: he sold his place in Plymouth to Samuel Eddy in 1631 and removed to Duxbury. He was an original proprietor of Bridgewater, where he came late in life, with his son Edward. He was at Leyden with the Pilgrims and left a brother, Thomas, who lived and died in Holland. He had a share in the first division of lots at Plymouth in 1623, and of the live stock in 1627. He married first, Jane Cooke, daughter of Francis and Hester (Mahiew) Cooke, 1627. The wife of his old age was named Mary, but her family name is not known. He died 1689 at eighty years of age.

These are to publish and declare to all whom it may concerne tht I exsperience Mitchell now living in the Towne of Bridgwater in the Collonh of new Plimoth being through the Mercy of God of sound Judgement and menory do Ordeine and make my last will and Testament in manner following: viz: into the hans of Gopd I Comend ny sperit beleiveingly Resigneing up my soule into the everlasting armes of Gods mercy father Son and holy spirit: my Body to bee decently Intered at the discretion of my eccutor and other Christian Friends: and for my outward estate I do will that after all my Just debts and funerfall exspences be paid: my lands and other moveables be disposed of as followeth.

Imprimis I give to my Son Edward michell after my deseace all my lands both upland and medow lying in the Towne of Duxborough at the place where I formerly dwelt as appeareth by deed: and if it shall please God so to order that my wife mary michell shall survive me: I Require my Son Edward to take Care of her for her Comfortable subsistence during her life: provided that she will live with him at Bridgwater: but if she rather incline to live at Duxborough: I then Order that halfe the rent of that land at Duxborough shall be to my wife during her life and after my desease my Son Edward shall have the sole dispose of it as to the letting of it out for the house, I acknowledge it to be his: allso the bed and bolster two pillowes one paire of sheets and two Blankets which are at my son Edwards and we made use of: I give them to him after our desease

As for my Son John I have formerly given him his proportion of land and my will is that he rest satissfied therewith, which was foure score acers of upland and foure acers of medow lying at namatakeset within the Towneship Duxborough: this is the full of what I intend him as to land only there are severall moveables in his hand at present which are mine: of which one Cow a short Gun and a small Iron kettle

I Give unto my Granson Exceprience: and the remainder I give unto my son John as [for my] land lying in the Towne of Middlebery:

I give it to my Daughters Mary Shaw Sarah Hayward and Hannah Hayward and to my granson Experience Mitchell the son of my son John, to be equally devided betwene them

BERIAH SMITH ANCESTRY

Smith was the most common of all surnames as it was applied to artificers in wood as well as metal in fact to all mechanical workers, hence its great frequency. Among the Highlands of Scotland the smith ranked third in dignity to the chief from his skill in fabricating military weapons and his dexterity in teaching the use of them. In Wales there were three sciences which a tenant could not teach his son without the consent of his lord--Scholarship, Bardism, and Smithcraft. The latter was one of the liberal sciences and the term was more comprehensive. Different branches of knowledge were united in the profession which are now practiced separately, such as raising the ore, converting it into metal, etc.

TINKHAM ANCESTRY²⁰³

The name, Tinkham, appears to have originated in Devon County, England, first appearing in records there, about 1550. The first spelling of the name was most likely, Teigncombe. The "Teign" part of the name undoubtedly refers to the Teign River, and the "combe" is an anglo-saxon word meaning, a bowl-shaped valley. A place called, Teigncombe was listed in the 1951 Census of England, located in Chagford Parish, the Okehampton District of Devon County.

Most American Tinkhams descend from Ephraim Tinkham, who immigrated from England to Massachusetts, ca. 1630. Only one Ephraim has been found in English parish records. Ephraim, of John Tinkecombe and Matthias (Beare), was christened, 23 February 1618, at Barnstaple, Devon County, and appears to have been born about 1616 near Ashburton. Ephraim, the immigrant was the indentured servant of Timothy Hatherly, who according to Governor Bradford, settled at Scituate, Massachusetts, in 1632. Hatherly had previously settled, been burned out, and been in and out of the colony as a business agent. He sailed from Barnstaple, Devon County 10 April 1732, on the ship, Charles, which arrived at Boston, 5 June 1632. Had Ephraim accompanied him on this trip, he could have been fourteen years old, the customary age for apprenticeship or servitude.

In 1634, Ephraim's indenture was transferred to John Winslow. The indenture was completed, 2 August 1642, when Ephraim was awarded twenty-five acres of land. Timothy Hatherly and John Winslow were present at the awarding to attest to Ephraim's service, as the original indenture had been lost. Ten additional acres were awarded, 17 October 1642. Ephraim married Mary Browne, ca. 1647. Mary was the orphaned daughter of Peter Browne, and original Mayflower passenger, and one of those entitled to shares in the Colony's enterprises.

Ephraim apparently lived at Duxbury until about 1660 when he became one of the first settlers of Middleboro, Massachusetts. At about this time he was made a sergeant in one of the Plymouth Militia Companies. From that time he was commonly referred to as, Sarjint Tincom. He served in the King Phillip War, in 1675, which caused him and other Middleboro families to abandon their homes and return to Plymouth. After the War, he remained at Plymouth. His three oldest sons occupied the Middleboro property. Ephraim served the Colony as Surveyor of Highways, Selectman for both Middleboro and Plymouth, and on numerous occasions was an appraiser of estates. He served on juries and was a member of the Grand Council. He died shortly before June 1685.

John was aged fourteen and Philip eleven at the date of their sailing. Their father was considerably younger than his wife. Mary, their eldest child was probably deceased before her parents' coming to America, and another child, Philip, baptized 2 June 1622, died five days later. The second son of that name, aged eleven in 1635, was thus born in 1624, but after 1622 there is a gap in the Church register, which continues until 1652.

WELLINGTON ANCESTRY²¹⁵

Roger Wellington, the founder of his family in America, was born in England about 1609. He came to this country in 1630, and in 1636 bought fourteen acres of land on the border of Watertown and Cambridge, now called Belmont. Here he settled, and at about the same time married Mary, eldest daughter of Dr. Richard Palgrave of Charlestown who is mentioned in books of that time as "a right godly man and skillfull surgeon." There are records of several purchases of land made by Roger Wellington after the birth of his first child in 1638, and in 1642 mention is made of a new house, barns, and the purchase of sixteen acres of meadow land near Fresh Pond. He died 11 March 1697 or 98, leaving six children.

The following is a copy of Roger Wellington's will:--

In the name and fear of God, Amen.

I Roger Wellington of Watertown, in the County of Middlesex, Massachusetts, Province in New England, being by reason of age and weakness now grown feeble as to my strength of body, yet sound of judgement and memory, do declare and publish this my last will and testimony--viz:--my immortal soul I do humbly and believingly commit and leave in the everlasting arms and mercies of God, Father, Son and Holy Ghost: my body to a decent burial at the discretion of my Executors herein after mentioned.

Hoping for a joyfull resurrection through the mercies of the dear Lord Jesus, I do give and bequeath in manner following, viz:--To my sons John, Joseph, Benjamin, Oliver, Palgrave and my Grandson John Maddock equal shares in lands and moveables. My just debts and funeral charges being first paid. To my Grandson Roger Wellington ten pounds to be paid him within one year after my death according to a bill having date the 28th of June, 1697. Also, I give and bequeath to my Granddaughter Mary, ten pounds to be paid her by my son Palgrave according to a bill having date the 28th of June 1697 or to her heirs being lawfully begotten of her own body, and to none others.

And I also give to my son Oliver Wellington one feather bed and their belongings and my biggest brass kettle, which bed and kettle he has always had in possession.

I do nominate, constitute and appoint my sons John & Palgrave joint executors to this my last will and testament.

In witness I do herein put my hand and seal this 17th day of December, Anno Domini 1697.

WHITNEY ANCESTRY²²¹

I. Thomas Whitney

Thomas, son of **Robert and Elizabeth (Guillims) Whitney**, was not a native of the city of his residence, but had come from one of the oldest and most distinguished families in the west of England, the Whitneys of Whitney, where on the banks of the Wye, the crumbling ruins of their ancestral castle could still be seen surviving centuries of border warfare. The family name, Whitney, or as originally written, De Whitney, was derived from the name of the parish where the castle stood. On 10 May 1583, he obtained from the Dean and Chapter of Westminster a license to marry Mary, daughter of John Bray, in which he is described as "Thomas Whytney of Lambeth Marsh, gentleman," and on 12 May the marriage ceremony was performed in St. Margaret's, Westminster, London, England

II. JOHN WHITNEY

(Thomas, Robert)

John Whitney probably received for those days a good education in the famous "Westminster School", now known as St Peter's College, and 22 February 1607, was apprenticed by his father to William Pring of the Old Bailey, London. Pring was a "Freeman of the Merchant Tailors' Company, then the most famous and prosperous of all the great trade guilds, numbering in its membership distinguished men of all professions, many of the nobility, and the Prince of Wales. March 13, 1614, Whitney became a full-fledged member. Marrying soon after he took up his residence at Isleworh-on the Thames, eight miles from Westminster, and there three children were born. There too, his father apprenticed to him his youngest brother, Robert, who served seven years, moved from Isleworth, probably back to London. Entries in the registers of the parish of St. Mary Aldermery indicate that he lived there-in "Bowe lanne," near Bow church, where hang the famous bells--for several years. Early in April 1635, he registered with his wife Elinor and sons John, Richard, Nathaniel, Thomas, and Jonathan as a passenger in the ship "Elizabeth and Ann, Roger Cooper, Master" which a few weeks afterward completed her lading and set sail from Ipswich, London for the New World. They probably arrived in this country in June, and settled in Watertown.

John Whitney was admitted freeman 3 March 1636 and the following year was for the first time elected by his associates as one of the Select Men of the town. He held the office for many years afterward. In 1655 he was elected town clerk. He was appointed constable 1 June 1641 by the General Court at their quarter session held in Boston. As a badge of his office a constable was required to carry a black staff, five or five and a half feet long, with a tip or head five or six inches long. He held a very respectable social position in the community.

WRIGHT ANCESTRY²²⁵

I. Edward Wright

Edward Wright came to New England about 1650, from Warwick, England. He sold to John Hoare, 4 March 1671/2 all his right and title to an estate in "Castell Bromwick," (Castle Bromwich) in the County of Warwick, England, which fell to him as only son and heir of **Francis Wright** of the same place. He received in part payment a house in Concord, of which John and Alice Hoar made full deed 1 August 1682. He married in Boston, 27 March 1657, Mary Powell, and married second at Sudbury, 18 June 1659, **Hannah Axtell** (or Upson). He and his third wife, Elizabeth, deeded lands 26 January 1683, to his sons Samuel and Edward, they to pay certain sums to their three sisters; conditions included life income for himself and wife. He also gave land 31 December 1683, to his son Peter, on the occasion of his marriage to Elizabeth, daughter of widow Elizabeth Lambson. An agreement was signed by all the heirs at a later day. Peter agreed to pay a certain sum to his sister Sarah. He died intestate 7 August 1703; administration of his estate granted 6 September 1703, to wife Elizabeth and eldest son Samuel.


